

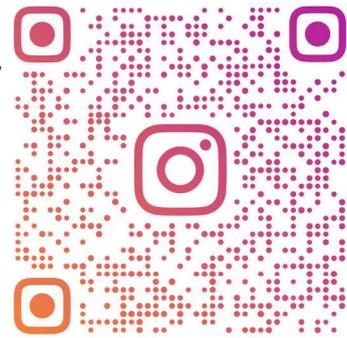

On/Crying - The Gravity of tears (2025)



"On/Crying – The Gravity of Tears" is an ode to tears and a celebration of the act of crying. The work unfolds both as a performance and as an installation, inviting the audience to spend time in the landscape of tears. Shaping a collective crying room that embraces everything that comes before, during, and after the act of crying. The "Crying Room" is both the immersive scenography for the performance as well as an installation open to visitors outside of the performance times. The central questions of On/Crying are: What might a world look like that wholeheartedly embraces tears and crying - and thereby the vast range of emotions that crying can express? How does it affect our perception of each other and our surroundings if we allow ourselves to be in the realm of crying together?

"On/Crying – The Gravity of Tears," is inspired by the rituals of professional mourners and opens an associative space around the persona and landscape of tears. By crying in our presence, they shamelessly allow us to witness the power and resonance of tears, inviting us into the intimate and universal landscape of crying. Pleasurably and generously they share the sensual and purifying flood of tears, accompanying the transition into new situations when fundamental changes occur in life. They use the voice of crying unfiltered and joyfully—normally unacceptable in our society. They offer their tears as a gift to soften the space within and between us.

In "On/Crying" two performers hold "The Crying Room" - the space of tears together; as professional mourners do. Collectively they release the tears of the present, past, future, their own, and others. Their crying becomes a rebellion against a silenced, paralyzed society amid crisis and war. In a time of growing collective fear, anxiety, and sorrow, we meet the two mourner figures who collaborate with and draw from the enormous energy for potential change found in homeless crying.

The "Crying Space" is a sensual universe that affectionately portrays tears as glittering prisms - reflecting humanity translucent and vivid. It unfolds an interactive laboratory where the tangible connects with the poetic and the scientific with the imaginative. At first glance, the objects and expressions of the installation resemble the human tear system, which at a closer look reminds of the Earth's water cycles. It's a flowing, dripping, and seeping universe of fluids in constant motion and connectedness, as an image for the inner life that spills over its boundaries—bursting, overflowing, and streaming into consciousness. All installation elements are interconnected—light becomes images, images become ice, ice becomes water, and water becomes sound, etc.—bridging the tactile and the emotional.

The Laughing Crowd is a choreographic work and a concert for laughter performed by 8 dancers. The work explores laughter as a somatic experience, as a sonic universe as well as a social event.

The Laughing Crowd pays tribute both to enjoyment and human bonding that evolve through laughter and laughter's alluring connective energy. Laughter is being used as a prism to explore laughter's physical and audible manifestation, as well as laughter's social and emotional implications. Laughter can be both: a contagious act of uniting as a group, but also an uncontrollable and unpleasant way of exposing power and positioning within a group. Hence, laughter's landscape covers a broad spectrum of emotions that is being explored, distorted and magnified in The Laughing Crowd. Unravelling as a social dance in laughter's fundamental humanity, this work takes the audience onto a journey through the body's affective expressions.

Laughter can embody the theatrical, the dramatic, the exaggerated, the ugly and the unfiltered. The loss of control going along with unstoppable laughter is a crack in our present individualistic and staging-the-self times. This gap in our self control fosters laughter's liberating potential.

By bathing the audience in laughter the performance gives a collective experience of basic human connection. The core of the performance is kinesthetic empathy that is being activated by the dancers' laughter, their movement and the spatial choreography that unfolds as an interplay of the energies between performers and audience. The audience is gently included in the artistic expression of this work: both the performers and the audience are visually exposed and invited to observe each other as part of the performance.

The performers and the audience are sharing the performance space. The audience can actively choose how they would like to position themselves in the space and move around freely, making a choice whether to observe at a distance or to place themselves in close proximity to the performer(s). The spectators become aware of themselves, not only by the laughter's mirroring effects, but also by having to actively determine how to relate and to include themselves in the experience.

The performance exists in two versions:

A site-specific version that can perform site specific in urban spaces (indoors and outdoors) and in nature. This version of The Laughing Crowd premiered in a container hall at Metropolis Festival in May 2023 - emphasising the humanity within laughter and laughing bodies through the rawness of the industrial space.

A version for black box spaces with light design which premiered in January 2024 at the small stage of the Royal Danish Playhouse as part of KSelekt.

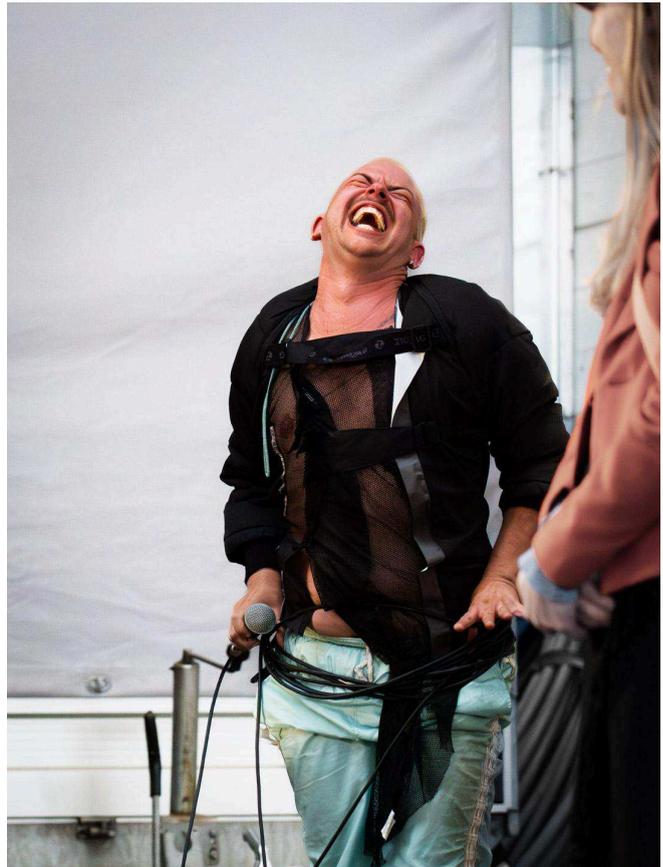

The Mirror Project (2022)



The Mirror Project is a choreographic work that addresses the relation between the real body as we can see and sense it and images of the body. A dance between two oversized mirrors and two performers unfolds a game of intersubjectivity between two mirrors, two performers and the audience. Working at the threshold between choreography and visual arts, this work merges the aesthetic with the sensual. Simultaneously exposing the dancers in a deep experience of movement which will be framed as a mirrored image, this work unravels the relation between body images and the sensuous potential of the body. The angles of the mirrors interfere with the audience's proprioception allowing the choreography to transform into an impactful kinesthetic experience for the audience. The audience's gaze is guided and seduced by bodies and bodily images in a universe of multiple mirrorings and associations.

The Mirror Project performs at theatres, museums and galleries. In museums and galleries The Mirror Project can be exhibited as an interactive installation in which the two oversized mirrors are activated by the audience.

The performance can then be presented on selected evenings.

The Laughing Game - A dance solo exploring the somatics of laughter

THE LAUGHING GAME is a dance solo exploring the somatics of laughter. A tribute to laughing as an act of human belonging and empathy. By anatomizing and dissecting the physicality of laughter - THE LAUGHING GAME exposes the wide range of emotions present within laughter, its contagious force and its liberating effect. Breaking with the common sense of looking at laughter as only being funny, laughing will be portrayed as a physical manifestation of a broad range of very mixed feelings.

The audience will enter an existential, not always rational portrayal of a human condition, that fluctuates between the wild and the absurd, the funny and the serious. By passing through a variety of states within laughter the performer takes the audience on a reflective and liberating journey through the captivating powers of laughter. The work doesn't only tell apart laughter and humor, it also separates the form and the sound of laughter from the intention and social context laughter has in everyday life.

THE LAUGHING GAME oscillates between a dance, an installation and a concert as the work equally involves body and voice work to unfold laughter as bodily state, stirring sound and sparkling sensation. The work is experienced in close proximity to activate the audience's physical empathy. The audience is invited to share the performance space with the performer who is moving among the audience members. That way the performer and the audience will blend, making all individuals visible, inviting to observe each other and giving the feeling that everyone is part of the performance. This situates the work at the verge of interactivity as the spectators will be transformed into participants by their pure presence and without asking them to do anything specific. The audience is invited to contribute to the performance by their immediate and unfiltered reactions.

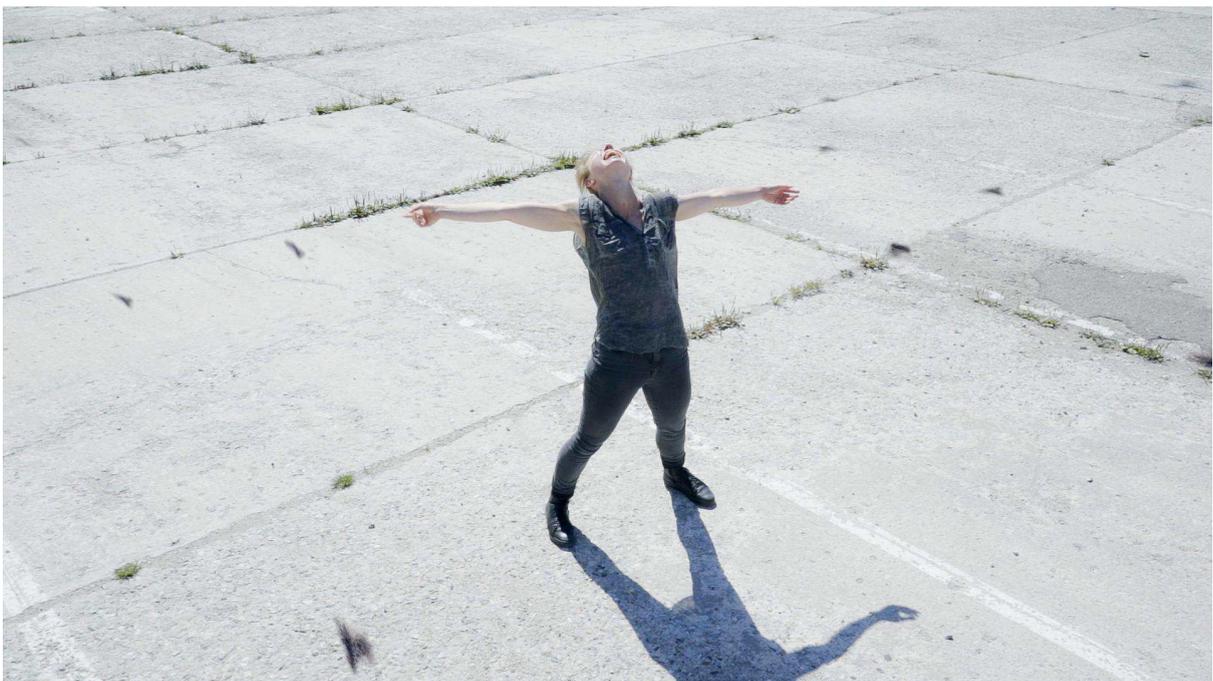

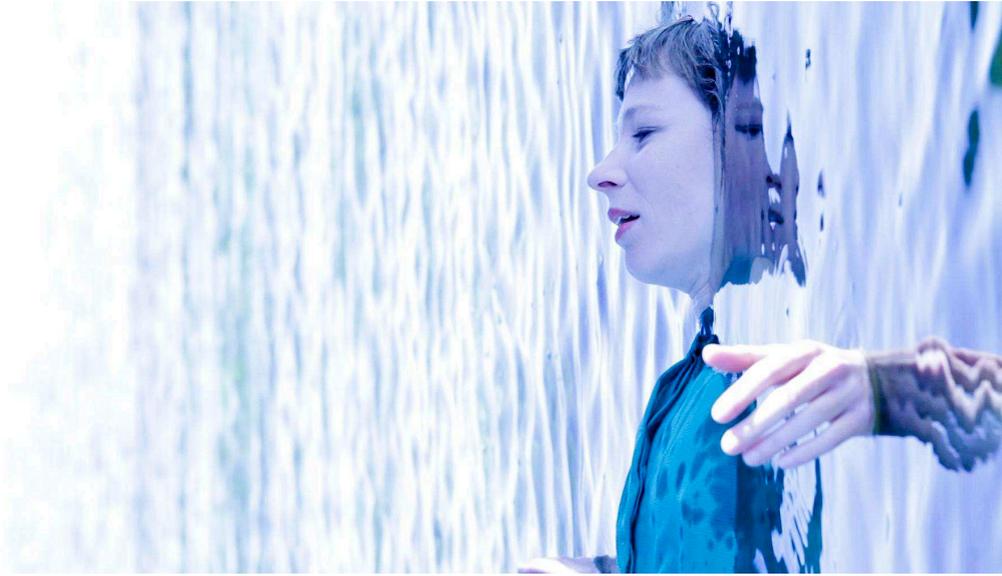
